Maxwell - A Very Popular Car!

In 1902, Benjamin Briscoe, a wealthy Detroit manufacturer of sheet metal products, invested in automobile pioneer David Buick. In 1903, Buick's inability to produce a marketable product led Briscoe to finance a young engineer named Jonathan D. Maxwell. By the end of 1905, 833 2-cylinder, water-cooled, front-engine Maxwell Runabouts had emerged from their Tarrytown, New York factory. They were \$750, well-designed and a good buy. They quickly became America's favorite, inexpensive 2-cylinder Runabout. By 1910, production topped 20,000 units and vied for third place in the industry. Production moved to Detroit in 1913. The origins of Plymouth can actually be traced back to the Maxwell automobile. When Walter P. Chrysler took over control of the troubled Maxwell-Chalmers car company in the early 1920s, he inherited the Maxwell as part of the package. In 1928, Chrysler-Plymouth produced a Model Q, which was a re-worked Maxwell.
